What uniquely qualifies you to represent the constituents of CD18 as their Representative in Congress? As a healthcare professional and dentist, I understand the complexities of our current public health crisis. High prescription drug costs force many Americans to choose between medications and essential needs. In Congressional District 18, nearly 1 in 14 people live below the poverty line, often prioritizing health over food. Rising mental health issues and substance use disorders among youth demand expanded mental health funding and services to help them lead healthy lives.

Environmental degradation disproportionately impacts vulnerable communities, leading to serious health problems like asthma and heart disease. In neighborhoods like Kashmere Gardens, hazardous facilities near homes affect residents' life expectancy. This environmental injustice must be addressed to protect community health.

The cancer cluster in the Fifth Ward highlights the need for accessible and affordable health services. Individuals battling cancer deserve various treatment options without financial ruin. We must ensure that cancer treatment is within reach for everyone, regardless of socioeconomic status.

As an advocate for health equity, I am uniquely positioned to address these pressing issues. As your representative in Congress, I will champion healthcare access expansion, promote mental health and substance use treatment, reduce prescription drug costs, and support research-based interventions. As a City of Houston Council Member, I regularly engage with federal, state, and local governments on these issues. My healthcare background provides a distinctive perspective on our challenges, and I am committed to driving meaningful change for our community.

Philosophy and Issues

Should you become the Representative for CD18, what do you hope to accomplish during your first term in office? Before the completion of your service as a member of Congress?

I will address health disparities affecting communities of color, particularly in areas like the Fifth Ward's cancer cluster. Cancer rates in black communities are significantly higher, with breast, lung, and prostate cancers requiring targeted interventions. To combat these disparities, I propose increasing funding for cancer research focused on racial disparities, expanding access to early detection and screening programs, and ensuring affordable treatment facilities. Additionally, I will advocate for stricter regulations on industrial pollution in vulnerable neighborhoods, having already engaged with the Environmental Protection Agency and healthcare professionals on this issue. Areas like Kashmere Gardens should not be burdened with hazardous facilities emitting dangerous toxins.

Another critical issue is the maternal mortality rate among black women, which is tragically higher than other demographics. To address this, I will work to increase access to comprehensive prenatal and postnatal care, particularly in underserved areas including supporting community health centers, enhancing Medicaid coverage for maternal health, and promoting the use of culturally competent doulas and midwives. I will also push for establishing maternal mortality review committees to investigate and address the root causes of these deaths.

Additionally, I am committed to supporting the Biden Administration's Cancer Moonshot program to cut cancer rates and mortality by at least 50% over the next 25 years, ensuring these benefits reach every community.

If you are elected to this position, on which committee(s) of Congress would you most like to serve and why?

As a healthcare professional, my expertise and experience would make me invaluable on the House Ways and Means Subcommittee for Health, which oversees critical health-related issues, including healthcare payments, delivery systems, and health research. My professional background in patient care, healthcare administration, and financial aspects of healthcare services equips me with the comprehensive understanding necessary for evaluating bills related to Medicare and Medicaid. I bring practical insights into how health programs impact patients and providers, assessing legislation from those directly affected.

Black women are a significant voting bloc in the U.S. With the potential for the first Black and Asian American woman president, it's crucial for women of color in CD18 to have a compelling reason to vote. I am committed to being that reason and advocating for the community's most pressing issues.

In what ways do the principles of the Democratic Party inform or reflect your personal philosophy? The principles of the Democratic Party deeply resonate with my personal philosophy of serving the people and prioritizing their needs above all else. The Democratic Party's commitment to social justice, economic equity, and inclusive governance aligns perfectly with my belief in advocating for the underrepresented and marginalized communities. My record in public service, marked by initiatives such as advocating for police reform and addressing habitability issues for renters, reflects the party's dedication to creating a fair and equitable society. Furthermore, the Democratic Party's emphasis on healthcare for all, educational opportunities, and protecting reproductive rights underscores my own commitment to ensuring that every individual has access to the resources and support they need to thrive.

What are the three most important issues Congress must deal with and what is your proposal for doing so?

Congress must address healthcare for all Americans. I propose a public health care option to guarantee universal, affordable, high-quality care, reduce prescription drug prices, and eliminate deductibles for essential services. Expanding funding for mental health and substance use treatment and eliminating racial and geographic health inequities are crucial. Strengthening Medicare, Medicaid, and the Affordable Care Act with a public option will create a comprehensive healthcare system for everyone, including CD-18 constituents.

Economic equity and job creation are essential. I advocate raising the federal minimum wage to \$15 an hour, ensuring equal pay for equal work, and enhancing workers' rights to unionize and bargain collectively. Investing in infrastructure, clean energy, and advanced manufacturing will create millions of well-paying jobs. Supporting small businesses, especially those owned by women, people of color, LGBTQ+ individuals, and veterans, will drive economic growth and inclusivity.

Education is the foundation of our future. I support universal early childhood education and affordable, high-quality childcare to give every child a strong start. Investing in public K-12 schools to ensure a world-class education for all children, regardless of ZIP code, is crucial. Making higher education affordable and accessible, including student debt relief, will empower future generations. Opposing policies that disadvantage communities of color and underserved communities, and promoting lifelong learning and skills development, will prepare workers for the evolving job market.

Beyond these priorities, comprehensive immigration reform, addressing climate change, and safeguarding voting rights are critical to building a just and equitable society. Healthcare, economic equity, and education are foundational pillars supporting the progress and well-being of all Americans.

How can Congress (with Presidential support) better and more humanely control illegal immigration across the Southern Border or elsewhere?

As a Democrat, I advocate for a compassionate, integrated, and legally stable immigration policy. I firmly oppose family separation and protested against the Trump administration's inhumane detention practices. Our immigration policy should focus on humane treatment and support rather than punitive measures. Key elements include:

- 1. Creating a clear and fair pathway for undocumented immigrants to acquire citizenship. While the Biden administration's protection of U.S. citizens' spouses is positive, we need a compassionate asylum process for those fleeing violence and persecution.
- 2. Establishing legal means for undocumented immigrants to stay in the country, even if citizenship is not immediately attainable. This approach provides legal stability and supports integration.
- 3. Facilitating the transition from temporary visas to permanent legal status. Temporary visa holders significantly contribute to the U.S. economy and society and deserve stability and security.
- 4. Expanding legal immigration pathways to promote diversity, strengthen the workforce, and address demographic challenges. Welcoming more immigrants who wish to contribute benefits our nation.
- 5. Opposing increased deportations and harsh penalties for businesses hiring undocumented workers. Such measures destabilize local economies and harm communities. A fair and just immigration system is essential.
- 6. Opposing the expansion of the border wall with Mexico. Instead, investing in technology-driven border security measures that respect human rights and foster cooperation with neighboring countries is crucial. This includes using UAVs, ground sensors, automatic license plate readers, and biometric identification systems.

Our immigration policy should reflect our values of compassion, integration, and legal stability.

What, if anything, should Congress do to restore and protect abortion rights and rights of reproductive autonomy?

To restore and protect abortion rights and reproductive autonomy, Congress must take decisive action to uphold the right to safe and legal abortion as established by Roe v. Wade, ensuring it remains accessible to all women, regardless of their socioeconomic status or geographic location. This includes passing federal legislation that codifies these rights, thereby preventing states from enacting restrictive laws that hinder access to reproductive health services. Congress must also oppose any efforts to restrict access to reproductive health services, including abortion, contraception, and comprehensive sex education, ensuring that women have the freedom to make informed decisions about their bodies.

Furthermore, Congress should support policies that provide comprehensive, evidence-based reproductive health education in schools and communities. This includes guaranteeing access to a full range of reproductive health services, such as prenatal and postnatal care, family planning, and preventive services. By investing in these areas, lawmakers can create a robust support system that empowers individuals with the knowledge and resources they need to make informed decisions about their reproductive health.

What do you plan to do to protect and expand voting rights and protect the basic tenets of democracy? As a strong Democrat, my plan to protect and expand voting rights, as well as to safeguard the basic tenets of democracy, begins with a firm commitment to defending and expanding the Voting Rights Act. This pivotal legislation must be fortified to ensure every American can exercise their right to vote without

facing barriers, including voters in CD-18 who often find themselves purged from voter rolls. We must begin by addressing and dismantling practices that suppress voter turnout, particularly among marginalized communities, that have included restricting mail in ballots and reducing voting schedules and centers, thereby eliminating populations like seniors, and blue collar workers from voting.

Additionally, I will advocate for robust protections against discrimination based on race, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, disability, and religion. These protections are essential to creating a society where everyone is treated equitably and with respect. I will champion the rights of the LGBTQ+ community, ensuring they have access to the resources and protections they deserve.

What policies and initiatives will you advocate to reduce student debt? What would be your approach to making higher education more affordable and accessible?

I will advocate for a multi-faceted approach that addresses both the burden of existing debt and the high cost of obtaining a degree. First, I support comprehensive student debt forgiveness programs that target those most in need, particularly low-income borrowers and those in public service fields. This will help alleviate the financial strain on graduates who are struggling to repay their loans. In CD18, where 21% of incomes fall below the poverty line, student debt relief is vital.

In addition to debt forgiveness, I propose implementing policies that reduce the cost of higher education upfront. This includes increasing federal and state funding for public colleges and universities to lower tuition rates, expanding Pell Grants, and providing more substantial financial aid packages to students from low- and middle-income families. By doing so, we can make higher education more attainable for all.

Moreover, I will push for the expansion of community colleges and vocational training programs, offering more affordable pathways to quality education and good-paying jobs. These initiatives should be coupled with efforts to ensure that higher education institutions are held accountable for their tuition costs and the outcomes of their graduates, promoting transparency and efficiency in the use of funds.

What policies will you advocate to reduce poverty in our district? What are your strategies for economic development to lift individuals and families out of poverty?

I will advocate for policies addressing income inequality and economic opportunities for all residents. My top priority is raising the federal minimum wage to \$15 an hour, ensuring all workers earn a living wage. This change will significantly impact the 52,802 households currently below the poverty line and the 58,432 households earning below \$25,000 annually. Increasing the minimum wage will lift many families out of poverty and provide financial stability.

I will support policies ensuring equal pay for equal work and enhance workers' rights to unionize and collectively bargain. These measures are crucial for economic equity and empowering workers. Additionally, I propose investing in infrastructure, clean energy, and advanced manufacturing to create millions of good-paying jobs. These investments will benefit the 60,371 households earning between \$25,000 and \$50,000, and the 77,875 households earning between \$50,000 and \$100,000.

Supporting small businesses, especially those owned by women, people of color, LGBTQ+ individuals, and veterans, is essential for driving innovation and economic growth. I propose policies to reduce the cost of higher education by increasing funding for public colleges and universities, expanding Pell Grants,

and providing more substantial financial aid for low- and middle-income families. Making median household income of \$58,805, making higher education more affordable will empower individuals to secure better-paying jobs, reducing poverty and fostering economic mobility in our district.

What can be done to lower the price of basic necessities such as food, shelter, healthcare, and other costs of living?

We must maximize the Inflation Reduction Act's provisions and introduce new legislation for long-term solutions. The Act reduces family costs by lowering prescription drug prices, expanding affordable healthcare, and offering tax credits for energy-efficient home improvements. Fully implementing these measures will ease financial burdens on households.

Additionally, long-term affordability requires enhanced food supply chains and reduced food prices through local agriculture support, improved transportation infrastructure, and addressing labor shortages in the food industry. Federal investment in sustainable farming and regional food hubs can lower costs and increase food security. Policies to ensure affordable housing should include expanded funding for public housing, tax incentives for affordable housing development, and rent control measures.

Healthcare cost reduction remains a critical priority. Building on the Inflation Reduction Act, we should introduce legislation to further reduce essential healthcare costs, expand access to preventive and mental health care, and support comprehensive reforms that include a public option.

By maximizing current legislation and introducing targeted, long-term policies, we can lower basic living costs and improve the quality of life for CD18 constituents.

What is your view about the necessity (or lack thereof) for gun safety legislation and what proposals would you support (and which, if any, of them would you oppose)?

Gun safety legislation is crucial to ensure that no American feels unsafe at work, in worship, at leisure, or in schools. Since the Uvalde tragedy, about 652 school shootings have resulted in 38 deaths and 111 injuries, demonstrating an urgent need for action. I advocate for comprehensive gun safety measures to protect citizens while respecting responsible gun ownership.

Strengthening background checks for firearm purchases is critical. It's unacceptable that obtaining a gun is often easier than getting a driver's license. Rigorous background checks will help keep firearms from terrorists, domestic abusers, violent criminals, and individuals showing signs of danger.

Treating gun violence as a public health crisis involves addressing its root causes through targeted policies and research. I support mental health counseling in schools and communities. We must balance gun owners' rights with public safety, promoting responsible ownership and safe storage practices.

Texas, with the second-highest mass shootings in 2023, highlights the need for effective legislation. By encouraging safety and responsibility, we can uphold the Second Amendment while ensuring public safety. It is essential to enact sensible gun safety laws to protect our communities and prevent further loss of life.

The U.S. has used foreign policy to fight inhumane practices abroad and also to further our security and economic interests. What goals should the U.S. be furthering through foreign policy, if any? What tools should the U.S. use in accomplishing those goals (i.e., economic sanctions, military intervention, etc.)? The U.S. should use its foreign policy to combat inhumane practices abroad while also advancing our security and economic interests. One of our primary goals should be promoting global peace and stability through diplomatic efforts, such as advocating for an immediate and lasting ceasefire between conflicting parties like Israel and Hamas. Supporting a negotiated two-state solution in the Middle East exemplifies our commitment to peace-building processes and the protection of human rights. By focusing on meaningful progress and providing a political horizon for the Palestinian people, we can work towards a durable peace that benefits all parties involved.

To achieve these goals, the U.S. should employ a combination of diplomatic tools, including economic sanctions, targeted financial measures, and international cooperation. These can be effective in pressuring regimes and organizations that engage in or support terrorism and human rights abuses. Military intervention should be a last resort, reserved for situations where all other options have been exhausted, and immediate action is necessary to protect innocent lives. Prioritizing diplomacy and cooperation is essential to build alliances, foster mutual respect, and work towards a world where terrorism, whether state-led or people-led, is unequivocally opposed, and peaceful resolutions are the norm.

How, specifically, do you plan to help the people of CD18?

To help the people of Congressional District 18, I will prioritize listening to the diverse needs of our community and implementing policies that address critical issues such as healthcare, economic opportunity, and education. With a total population of 768,562 and significant racial diversity, including a high proportion of Black and Hispanic residents, I will focus on creating it inclusive solutions. One pressing concern is the Fifth Ward Cancer Cluster, which requires immediate attention. I will advocate for comprehensive healthcare initiatives that expand access to affordable, high-quality care, particularly targeting areas with high health disparities. This includes increasing funding for cancer research and treatment centers and ensuring all residents, especially those 52,802 households below the poverty line, receive necessary medical support.

Addressing habitability issues for renters is another critical priority. With 142,603 renter-occupied housing units, ensuring safe and decent living conditions is essential. I will push for stronger tenant protections and increased funding for housing inspections to address substandard living conditions. To increase economic opportunities, I will support initiatives to raise the federal minimum wage to \$15 an hour, provide robust support for small businesses, and invest in infrastructure projects that create good-paying jobs. With a median household income of \$58,805, these measures will help lift many out of poverty and reduce the 21.1% poverty rate. Additionally, by promoting 21st-century education, including universal early childhood education and affordable higher education, we can equip the 218,966 people aged 18-34 and others with the skills needed for the evolving job market.

What do you plan to make your signature issue as a member of Congress and how do you plan to address it?

My primary focus is equitable healthcare access, addressing the stark disparities within CD-18's diverse community of 768,562 residents. This includes the urgent issue of the Fifth Ward Cancer Cluster, disproportionately affecting residents.

I will advocate for increased federal and state funding to enhance healthcare infrastructure, particularly in underserved areas. This means boosting support for community health centers, improving access to preventive care, and investing in advanced medical research and treatment facilities. Implementing a public health care option will ensure affordable healthcare for all, easing the financial burden on the 52,802 households living below the poverty line.

I will also push for legislation expanding mental health and substance use treatment services, aiming to eliminate racial and geographic health inequities. Strengthening Medicare, Medicaid, and the Affordable Care Act, while including a public option, is key to my policy. My goal is to create an inclusive, equitable healthcare system addressing the specific health challenges of CD 18, ensuring every resident can live a healthy and fulfilling life.
